Harish was threatened that his parents would be killed if he did not submit to his uncle's, and sometimes his friends' barbarism. Until one fine day when Harish musters up the courage and says 'No!' He takes his mother into confidence who supports him, but Harish's woes do not end there. He is castigated by society, his own father believes Harish to be at fault, and so begins Harish's solo battle to help other sufferers like himself. There are others: noted film director Anurag Kashyap, a victim of incest and sexual abuse, not once but many times over; Jai, living in a Mumbai high-rise suffers abuse and a now 34-year-old mother who suffered sexual abuse as a 12-year-old. The stories in *The Bad Touch* will shock, horrify, sadden, repulse and numb the reader.
