The lectionary plays a crucial role in both personal and communal worship, guiding the selection of passages for sermons, prayers, and reflections. History and Origins of the Lectionary

Early Christian Worship and Scripture Reading

Eastern Orthodox Lectionary

The Eastern Orthodox Church uses a distinctive lectionary system that aligns with its liturgical traditions and calendar. The Orthodox lectionary emphasizes readings from the Septuagint version of the Old Testament and includes numerous feast days dedicated to saints and events significant to Eastern Christianity.
